We will keep in touch over the next few weeks, either by phone or on your doorstep.

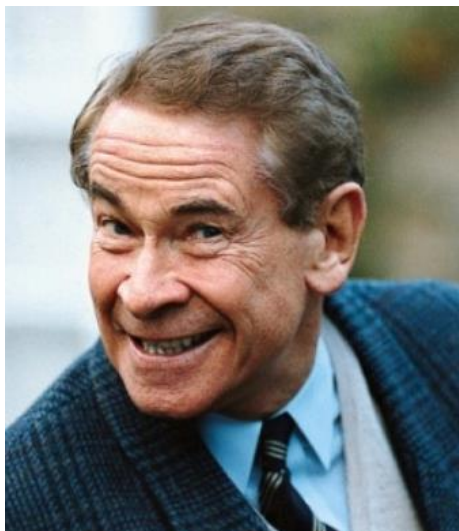
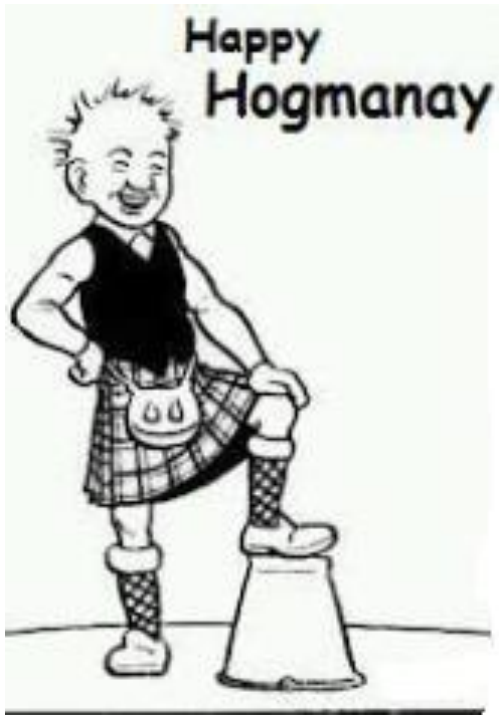
Stay indoors, keep safe and help the NHS. And together, we are going to beat this virus and get back together again for fun, friendship, entertainment and joyful singing and dancing.
